forget that you exist.

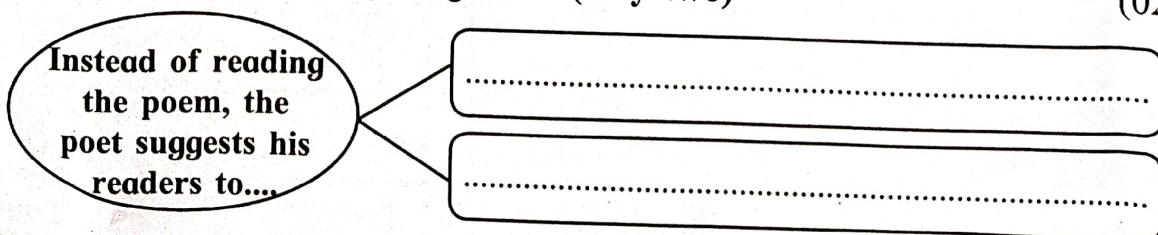

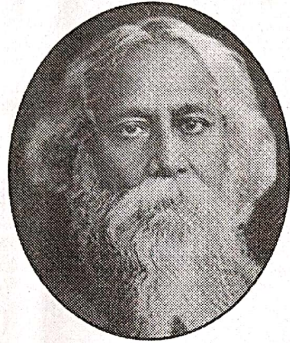



He was born on 7th May, 1861 in Kolkata, West Bengal State of India. He was awarded the Nobel Prize in literature for his outstanding poetry book-Geetanjali. He passed away on 7th August, 1941 in Kolkata.



Kusumagraj was a great Marathi poet of Maharashtra. He was a poet, playwright, novelist and short story-writer. He wrote in Marathi language. He was born on 27th February, 1912 in Pune, Maharashtra. He was honoured with the prestigious 'Dnyanpeeth Award'. His well-known literary works are – 'Vishakha' and 'Natsamrat'. He passed away on 10th March, 1999 in Nashik.
